Learn the Signs. Act Early.

You know your child best

If your child is not meeting milestones or you are concerned about the way your child plays, learns, speaks, acts, or moves, talk with your child's doctor, share your concerns and ask for a developmental screening.

If you or the doctor is still concerned:

- 1. Ask for a referral to a specialist and,
- 2. Call for a free evaluation to find out if your child can get services to help:

If your child is under age 3:

Call your state or territory's early intervention program.




